**1. Martin Dunn** *Poor Lazarus* 24"x36" Oil Painting \$1600

Five years ago my life was very different. I was a doctor, making over a million dollars a year. I had never picked up a paintbrush. And I was miserable. By God's grace, I was able to walk away from that life. All of it. In place of it, I now have clarity, peace, and the unexpected gifts of my art and my friends. My art is my refuge. My friends are the "real people" - disadvantaged, homeless, overlooked. Now my art and friends are one. The "ones from whom men hide their faces" have found their voices in these paintings. The subject of Poor Lazarus is my friend Willie Bell; homeless for 35 years in affluent Sarasota. He has a freedom that comes from having nothing. Freedom unknown to the diners behind him. Freedom none of us will ever understand unless we take the time to know the Willie Bells.

Debra is a mixed-media artist and instructor. She received her Bachelor of Science degree in Art Education from James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA. She lived in Harrisonburg for 22 years before moving to San Francisco and then to Hawaii where she lived for 10 years.

**3. Judy Levine** *Taos Pueblo, New Mexico, We Are Americans Too* Photograph \$125

Taos Pueblo is the only living Native American (Tiwa) community designated both a World Heritage Site by UNESCO and a National Historic Landmark. The multi-story adobe buildings have been continuously inhabited for over a 1,000 years. Archaeologists say that ancestors of the Taos Indians lived in this valley long before Columbus discovered America and hundreds of years before Europe emerged from the Dark Ages. Taos Pueblo is considered to be the oldest continuously inhabited community in the USA. Here the Tiwa are free to practice their own spirituality, live in large family pueblos without heat, water or electricity. They are free to live and preserve their traditions.

Judith Levine is a teaching artist and co-founder of the Association of Florida Teaching Artists (AFTA). She attained a B.A. in art and art education and earned an M.F.A. in Visual Arts from Montclair State University, New Jersey where she was on the art education faculty. She was an art educator and district art supervisor in Parsippany N.J.

**5. Ben Hvar** *American Flag Hollywood* Painted Firecrackers \$10,000

This flag features 1,858 painted mini-firecrackers and 56 soil-filled firecracker stars. The blue canton was fashioned from 56 leaves of the First National Tree. Artist Otoh Ben-Hvar, MFA is a multi-faceted world renowned performance artist and fine artist who has created a unique art medium by painting with firecrackers, gun powder, fuses and propellants. His distinctive medium is known as Firecracker Art. Legally deaf, Ben uses vibrant paints and certain assembled explosives to create one-of-a-kind paintings that represent unique interpretations of specific stars which he views through telescopes. The vast range of pyrotechnics Ben uses to fire off the bombastic explosions all combine to create the distinctive volcanic animation of a single star. In patriotic celebration Ben creates exciting artwork that visually embodies the spirit of freedom and independence every American enjoys.

**6. Gale Fulton Ross** *Freedom?* 5'x5' framed NFS

"In my mind, violence, bigotry, and racism strips MY PEOPLE of our dignity as Americans thus taking a toll not only on our society but on us individually, mentally, physically, and spiritually, thus is our Holy Cost."

Gale originally hails from Boston where, during her childhood, she taught herself to paint through interaction with other artists. Over the past 30 years collectors and critics have followed her evolution to the "figurative abstractions" that capture the essence of her themes.

She is a portrait artist and abstract painter who gives her canvas all of herself – a vigorous mixture and wealth of African American culture- while enriching the history of American art.

Educated as an art historian and acclaimed as an artist of international renown, Fulton Ross delves deep into the soul of her subject, exposing raw human emotions. Her works are a blend of power and delicacy that reveal her own empathy.

Chaos and the uncontrollable are at the heart of everything I do. The creative process is messy and unreliable and I embrace that mess. Digital glitches are my chaos in this piece, deliberate corruption called data-moshing. My work intersects at societal inequalities and personal interests, which seem to intersect quite often for women, trans people, and people of color. As a strong, independent, gender fluid, pansexual, my sexual interests are often under attack. This piece explores "deviant" sexual choices that come under attack and how for many, our sexual freedom is not free at all. JJ Love is a single mother who survives physically by being a professor and spiritually by being an artist.

**8. Lori Loveberry George** *Surrender I & II* 72" x 36" Charcoal and Acrylic on paper \$1000ea

I have taken the opportunity with this piece to free myself of inhibitions, restraints, and boundaries imposed by a lifetime of technical training, and calculated, process-making decisions.

Award winning visual artist Lori Loveberry George is a 2008 graduate of Eckerd College with a BA in visual art, and a 1983 graduate of Ringling College of Art and Design, a printmaking major. Originally from Michigan, she attended Kendall College of Art and Design in Grand Rapids. She is a teaching artist with Sarasota County Schools and Sarasota County Libraries, and a member of the Association of Florida Teaching Artists (AFTA). She is actively involved in the community and local school art projects. Lori owns a decorative painting business in Sarasota, Florida, and continues to create and teach visual art at her Sarasota studio.

**9. Joel Seiden** *Unshackled* Weathered Black Marble Sculpture \$1500  
"Freedom," sang Janice Joplin, "is just another word for nothing left to lose." Fifty years ago, that kind of heedless determination inspired brave Americans to risk their lives and fortunes for some measure of freedom.  
While not remotely similar, the committed artist risks philosophical failure in the search for truth. Combining concept with craft, we overcome our comfort zone to explore new ideas.  
Feeble as our attempts are to depict 50 years of civil-rights sacrifice, artists must persist in pursuing fundamental meaning in the hope that the next 50 years will be easier.  
Joel Seiden, like most contemporary sculptors, traces his primary influences to the works of Constantin Brancusi and Isamu Noguchi in stone carving, David Smith and Julio Gonzales in welded steel.  
Unlike those giants, Seiden often introduces metaphorical inferences into his stylized sculptures, expressing political and social ideas about which he feels strongly. His passionately crafted works explore politics, history and humanity. Influences aside, Seiden's art remains authentically and unmistakably his own.

**10. Bruce Jackson** *Entering the U.S. (Zaragoza International Bridge, Ciudad Juarez/El Paso)* 2014 Photograph \$2000  
For some people "freedom" is flags and parades. For me, it's being in a place where you can go where you want to go, be what you want to be, and do what you want to do—so long as you don't interfere with somebody else trying to do the same things. And if you and someone else do wind up trying to occupy the same space at the same time, you talk it out; you don't shoot it out. When I was a very young boy my mother used to take me for rides on the Staten Island Ferry in New York. It cost only a nickel then and if you didn't get off you could go back and forth all day on that one fare. The ferry went by the Statue of Liberty, on the base of which is inscribed: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled massed yearning to breathe free." The poor and tired, who try to cross America's southern border now, seeking freedom, and hauled off to huge new prisons in the desert.  
The American border now is fences, motion detectors, lenses that see in the dark, and concertina razor-wire, as in this image, take on the Ciudad Juarez to El Paso footpath of the Ysleta-Zaragoza International Bridge. The wire begins at the point you leave Mexico and enter the United States. On the other side of the bridge, beyond several traffic lanes, is the footpath from El Paso to Ciudad Juarez. It has no wire of any kind. Bruce Jackson is SUNY Distinguished Professor and James Agee Professor of American Culture at University at Buffalo. He began his photographic work while Junior Fellow in the Harvard Society of Fellows. He is the author of more than 30 books and, with his wife Diane Christian (a SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor) director of six films. He was nominated for a Grammy and awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship. He has had 15 solo exhibits and been part of many group exhibits, including the 2014 Venice Biennale. His work is in the permanent collections of the Albright-Knox Art Gallery, George Eastman House, Bibliothèque national de France, the Library of Congress, and other organizations. His most recent books are Inside the Wire: Photographs from Texas and Arkansas Prisons (University of Texas Press, 2013) and Being There: Bruce Jackson, Photographs 1962-2012 (Burchfield Penney Art Center, 2013).

My life in art began as a child. Drawing on the walls of my childhood home and progressed over the years to become a method of self-expression and a medium for communicating my personal experience and ideas to others. These pieces are mostly pen and ink, black washes and charcoal. This subject material is varied from fauna and flora to people, including unusual and indigenous folk living lives that are far removed from modern society.  
The Black Seminole Warriors series was a great experience for me to use my talents in describing the plight of the Florida slaves escape to freedom with the help of the Seminole Indians.

As I see this woman sitting amongst all the rows and rows of headstones, her loved one has paid the ultimate price. I believe she is "Searching for Peaceful Answers" like all loved ones do, questions as to why certain individuals are chosen to die for our freedoms and why others are left to mourn and honor those who gave their lives.  
In August of 1969 I was drafted into the army. While serving I was severely wounded and awarded a Purple Heart. Upon my return home from service, I opened a music store in Sarasota Florida. Shortly thereafter, the music store was sold, I was hired by the United States Postal Service, originally as a mechanic, but once postal brass found out about my photography talent, I was sent working doing PR photography. I have many photographs published in postal newspapers and magazines. For a short period of time in the late 80's and early 90's I had a number of photos published in the local Sarasota newspapers and magazines. I have been the staff photographer for the Sarasota Chalk Festival and recently have won VA's National Art Contest at BY Pines, Florida in 2012 and 2013.

Gwendolyn's artwork has been featured in solo and group exhibitions in museums and cultural centers throughout the United States and abroad, including chosen by Lloyd Herman curator of the Renwick Gallery of the National Museum of American Art in Washington DC for a traveling museum show; the Lancaster Art Museum in Pennsylvania; the Susquehanna Art Museum in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania; the Museum of fine Arts in Tallahassee, Florida; COPIA: the American Center for Wine, Food and Arts in Napa, California; the Selby Gallery of the Ringling College of Art and Design in Sarasota; the Institute for Contemporary Art and the Nexus Foundation for Today's Art in Philadelphia; the American Embassy in Algiers; the American Embassy in Oman; the American Legation Museum in Tangiers, Morocco; and Archevecher in Paris.

## FEATURED VISUAL ARTIST, BRANDAN ODUMS

Brandan "Bmike" Odums is the founder and director of 2-Cent Entertainment LLC—a youth education social enterprise that produces mixed media content and events in the overlap between pop culture and social awareness. Founded in 2005, 2-Cent began as a hip-hop-oriented, grassroots, entertainment company geared towards addressing problems in the community. Since then the company, through Brandan's vision, has made itself a household name across New Orleans and surrounding areas.

Brandan uses his strongest weapon, his video camera, to create change in the community. Through his camera lens, he tells the stories and makes the statements that grab the attention of the younger generation who hold the responsibility to spark change in the world.

A highly sought after visual artist and filmmaker, Brandan's work has been seen on MTV, in the New Orleans Museum of Art, New Orleans Contemporary Arts Center, published in two college textbooks, a memoir about community resistance and illustrations in an cartography book about New Orleans. He has been commissioned by Red Bull and the New Orleans Hornets to create murals and invited by Scholastic to film a documentary of relief efforts in Haiti.

Brandan's recent works include "Project Be," a series of graffiti murals on the walls of the ruined Florida Avenue public housing complex in New Orleans' 9th Ward depicting iconic African-Americans and heroes of the civil rights movement. The discovery of his underground art gallery sparked a social media frenzy, receiving thousands of tweets, re-posting and editorials in local media outlets.
